Project Update

The past few months have seen some big progress with the project in Mastrick. A steering group of people from local churches has been meeting to drive the work forward. We're now pleased to announce that we are entering into a partnership with another Christian charity in Aberdeen to bring in some valuable experience - we're still working on some of the final details of this as this newsletter goes out.

As a result of the partnership we're going to be able to take on a gap year team starting this September. This team will be dedicated to full time youth work in the communities of Mastrick and Northfield. Elsewhere in this newsletter you can find an advertisement for members of this team, please consider this carefully and bring it to the attention of anyone who might be appropriate - it's going to be a fantastic opportunity to reach young people in a challenging environment. Please pray that God keeps showing us the right way to go at this crucial time for the project and that He leads us to the right people to join the team.





Breathe Update

Jay and Sandy Brownlee report the latest 'Breathe' news

We've had a great start to the 2007/8 session - it's hard to believe we're half way through already! September saw us join up with the guys behind Souled Out to run Breathe @ Encounter in the AECC. This was based on the theme of God the Transformer (how He can change your life); as part of the Encounter festival it was a rather different dynamic to what we're used to. Over 50 11-13 year olds were there and it was a real privilege seeing them taking part in worship and hearing about God so enthusiastically.

In October we returned to Whitehills with the theme "Bourne Again" focusing on what God can do with our past. In late November we were at Mid-Deeside Church in Kincardine O' Neil with a Christmas theme. Finally in December we were in Newmachar with a Simpsons Movie related theme focusing on looking after God's creation, with the new Scottish YFC director Graeme Brooks as guest speaker. The feedback from each of these events has been great with young people really opening up to what we've got to say it's a brilliant opportunity to share the Good News.

Again we've had a good time heading down to Gener8 in Arbroath each month, if you're in that part of the world make sure you head along. More information is at www.gener8.org.uk

Finally, session 2008-9 will see the launch of *Breathe Out*. This initiative aims to share the experience of our team with others - if you'd like to see an event like Breathe run regularly in your community we'll work with local volunteers over the year to equip them with all they need to make it happen. YFC Resources in Action

This issue Cat Lawson speaks to Adrian and Diane Davies at Fyvie Rock Solid club. The group meets on Thursday evenings in school term time in the Church Centre owned by Fyvie Parish Church. The group are aged between 10 years and 14 years old.

What kind of things do you do?

Diane: Games, chances to chat about issues. We adapt the Rock Solid materials to suit our group.

Adrian: We have had a barbecue with the group members' families invited to come.

Diane: We also had a film night and a Christmas party. We visited a nearby Sheltered Housing complex to sing carols on the night of our Christmas party.

What kind of response have you had from young people and their parents?

Diane: Initially very positive. Numbers have dwindled down to a very few before Christmas.

Why do you think numbers have gone down?

Adrian: We don't know, but I wonder if we should change to doing a more games-based club, get pool tables and so on.

Diane: Some parents mentioned that their teenagers were very involved in other festive activities and didn't have time to come to Rock Solid club.

Describe one thing that's happened at the club which really sticks out in your mind.

Adrian: How well the young people presented themselves when visiting the sheltered housing

complex to sing carols before Christmas.

Note from Cat: We also remember two of the leaders being covered in hair gel and make-up during a game one night! They will of course remain nameless but I might have been one of them.

What's the biggest problem in running the group?

Diane: Finding time to think through and organise the program before each week's club meeting.

Adrian: It does take a lot of effort before the night itself.

Why is Rock Solid suited to your group?

Adrian: It's useful if used flexibly.

How easy is it to share your faith with the group?

Adrian: After praying about sharing my faith it just seemed to flow. It seems much better and more natural if you keep it real, speaking from experience.

Have you any advice to other groups like yours?

Adrian: Trust God for everything and stay cool!

Adrian: It would be good to get together with other groups on neutral territory, especially in the summer when the weather's better.

Anything else?

Adrian: Happy New Ears!

Mastrick and Northfield are situated in the west of Aberdeen city and may be regarded as some of the more deprived areas of Aberdeen – household incomes are lower, crime rate is higher and a significantly higher percentage of young people in the area are recorded on the child protection register. We are looking for full time volunteers to join our team immersed in schools, drop ins and the wider community there. It'll be an unforgettable year seeing you grow in many ways, especially your own relationship with God.

We're looking for people who are:

- Outgoing, committed, passionate, able to cope well with times of stress and disappointment, and have a commitment to following God's call to mission
- Hungry to grow in faith and desire to be stretched
- Good team players, willing to follow direction and to take initiative when needed

What we will provide:

- Discipleship
- · Commitment on our part to see you grow
- Accountability
- Pre-programme and ongoing training and evaluation by an experienced youth worker

Living and training costs will be provided, though volunteers will be required to raise a fraction of their costs for the year.

As we leave 2007 and move into 2008 pray that leaders and young people alike can leave behind what is unhelpful and look ahead to a year more God-filled than the last

Pray that young Christians will have the courage to share their faith with everyone they meet, their friends, their teachers, their parents. Pray they can share their faith through actions as well as words, heeding the words of 1 Timothy 4:12

Pray that youth leaders will be re-energised for the new year and that they will rely on God for all things as through God even the impossible is possible

Pray for everyone who was at Deep Impact, that they connected with God and with each other. Pray that the words of God spoken through the speakers did not fall on deaf ears and that the kingdom of God can be furthered through it. Thank God for

School pupils and university students will be in the middle of exams or waiting for results just now. Pray that stress levels remain at helpful levels. Pray that results will allow young people to follow their dreams according to God's will.
